courtroom? At this point we don't intend to recall him as a witness. If he's not going to be called as a 3 THE COURT: witness then he may remain in the courtroom. 4 intending to call him back; is that correct? 5 MR. ROBERT: I express no opinion as to whether Dr. 6 Bagli will ever testify in this matter again. 7 THE COURT: Well, I take that to mean that he's not 8 going to be a witness, and he can remain in the courtroom. 9 10 MS. GOULD: Thank you. THE COURT: Please come forward and take your seat. 11 12 JESUS HERNANDEZ 13 after having been first duly sworn under oath, was questioned and testified as follows: 14 15 DIRECT EXAMINATION 16 BY MS. GOULD: 17 Ο. Good morning. 18 Good morning. Α. 19 Can you please state your name for the record? Q. 20 Α. Jesus Hernandez. 21 Q. Mr. Hernandez, how are you employed? 22 I'm employed by the city of Sunland Park Police Α. Department, and I've been assigned to the DEA task force for 23 the past four years, ma'am. 24 25 Were you on duty back on February 22nd of the 2006? Q.

- 1 Α. Yes, ma'am. Did you have incident to respond to the Lordsburg 2 Q. Border Patrol station regarding the seizure of marijuana? 4 Α. Yes, ma'am. 5 Did that incident involve Mr. and Mrs. Quaintance and Ο. Mr. Kripner? 6 7 Α. Yes, ma'am. I'm going to just cut to the chase here. 8 Q. 9 Approximately how much marijuana was seized from Mr. and Mrs. 10 Quaintance and Mr. Kripner on that day? 11 Approximately 177 pounds, I believe, ma'am. I've heard 172, does that sound correct? 12 Ο. 13 Α. Correct. Now, that translates to 77 kilograms of marijuana, 14 Q. 15 doesn't it? 16 Α. Yes, ma'am. In your experience, about how much marijuana does it 17 Q. 18 take to make the common, what we would call, say, joint or 19 marijuana cigarette weightwise? It's approximately about one gram, ma'am. 20 Α. So to do the math on 77 kilograms of marijuana, are 21 Q. there approximately 1,000 grams in a kilogram? 22
  - Q. So 77 kilograms would represent approximately 77,000 joints; correct?

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Yes, ma'am.

A. Yes, ma'am.

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- Q. Are you also familiar with the companion case on Joseph Butts, now it's all one case, of course, by indictment?
  - A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Are you aware of the fact that seized from his vehicle was 152 kilograms of marijuana?
  - A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. In your experience as a DEA agent, approximately how many marijuana cigarettes would that make?
  - A. I'd have to do the math.
- Q. I'll take you through it. You had testified already that it takes approximately one gram to make a marijuana cigarette; right?
- A. Right.
  - Q. And there is a thousand grams in a kilogram; correct?
  - A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. So 152 kilograms would be 152,000 cigarettes?
- 18 A. Correct.
  - Q. All right. So between the two seizures, in your estimation, would one kilo, or one gram being a marijuana cigarette, would you estimate that there is 229,000 marijuana cigarettes in those loads?
    - MR. ROBERT: Your Honor, this is pretty leading.
- 24 THE COURT: It is.
  - MS. GOULD: I'll just leave it at that, Your Honor, I

think the Court can do the math.

- Q. (By Ms. Gould) In your investigation of this case did you have incident to visit the Church of the Cognizance website?
  - A. Yes, ma'am.

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- Q. Can you explain how you came across that website in your investigation?
- A. It's written on several documents that we seized from Mr. Quaintance. I believe it's haoma, spelled H-A-O-M-A.org, and anybody can visit that site.
- Q. Okay. In the process of visiting that website did you come across certain pictures and print those off for purpose of the investigation?
- A. Yes, ma'am.
- MS. GOULD: May I approach the witness, Your Honor.

  THE COURT: Yes.
  - Q. I'm going to show you what I've marked as Government's Exhibit Number 1. Do you recognize that picture?
  - A. Yes, ma'am.
  - Q. Can you please tell me what that is and where you got it?
  - A. I got it off the website. It shows three children smoking marijuana.
  - Q. How did you get it off of that website? What were the steps you went through to get it?

1 Α. I clicked onto haoma.org and then I clicked onto another little, how can I say it, another little link they 2 3 have there that you can enter through that website, and it shows just marijuana plants and these little children smoking 4 marijuana. 5 Ο. Was it fairly easy to get to this picture? Α. Yes, ma'am. From that website? Ο. 8 9 Α. Yes, ma'am. 10 Q. Okay. 11 MS. GOULD: Your Honor, I would present this to defense counsel at this time and move to introduce it into 12 13 evidence. I think they've already seen it. 14 MR. ROBERT: I've seen it. 15 THE COURT: I'm sure they have. Any objection? 16 MR. ROBERT: No, Judge. 17 THE COURT: All right. Government's Exhibit Number 1 18 is admitted. 19 Q. (By Ms. Gould) Let's talk a little bit about your 20 seizure from the Lordsburg station. Did you take possession 21 of the marijuana that was found in the vehicles? 22 Α. Yes, ma'am.

It was big bundles in burlap.

Can you describe how it was packed? What did it look

like when you picked it up?

Ο. What kind of burlap? What do you mean by burlap? 1 Big potato sacks or big chile sacks that they use. 2 Α. 0. Inside those chile sacks what did you find? We found big bundles of marijuana. 4 Α. Now, when you say big bundles, do you mean -- what do 5 Q. you mean by bundles, is it wrapped with string or --6 I think those were -- I don't recall at this time how Α. they were wrapped exactly. I need to refresh my memory with 8 my notes, ma'am. 9 MS. GOULD: May I have a moment? 10 THE COURT: 11 Yes. 12 MS. GOULD: Your Honor, may I approach the witness? 13 THE COURT: You may. 14 Q. Mr. Hernandez, do you recognize that photograph? Yes, ma'am. 15 Α. Can you tell me what that is? 16 Q. 17 A. That's the marijuana we seized from the, from that 18 Lordsburg case, ma'am. 19 Q. Does that help to refresh your recollection about the packaging? 20 21 Α. Yes, ma'am. 22 Q. Can you describe the packaging for us? 23 It was a cord of foil and then rewrapped with brown 24 packaging tape, ma'am. 25

In your four years working for the DEA under the

Q.

Sunland Park Police Department, can you just estimate for us, I don't want an exact number, about how many drug seizure cases involving marijuana you've investigated?

- A. Roughly, it would be over 100.
- Q. Is it your experience that the marijuana you seized typically is packed in a certain way?
  - A. Yes, ma'am.

Q. Can you describe that, the packing for us that's the usual packing that you find?

MR. ROBERT: Your Honor, I object to the relevance of this. The way in which it's packed has nothing to say about the manner in which it's to be used or the purpose for which it's to be used.

THE COURT: Ms. Gould?

MS. GOULD: Your Honor, the reason we're going into the packing here is just to show that this is packed just as typically as any other load of marijuana that's been seized by the DEA at the Border Patrol checkpoint. That seems to indicate that this load is just like any other marijuana load and not necessarily from a monastery in Mexico at all.

MR. ROBERT: They're extrapolating from something that is absolute speculation and goes to no point. So I object to relevance and speculation, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Well, I, again, I think it's relevant so I will allow the testimony.

Q. (By Ms. Gould) Let me ask the question again. When -- or I'll ask a different question actually. When you look at something that's packed like this, is there certain process that needs to be gone through, according to your training, in order to get it in those bundles?

MR. ROBERT: Objection, unless the agent has had experiencing in packing it himself.

THE COURT: Lay a foundation.

- Q. (By Ms. Gould) In the process of your training to be an investigator for the DEA did you learn about the packaging methods that big drug organizations use in bundling up marijuana?
  - A. Yes, ma'am.

- Q. And what did you learn about that and where did you learn it?
  - A. There are several ways of packing it.

MR. ALMANZA: Objection, Your Honor, nonresponsive as to where he learned about it, and he hasn't answered that yet.

THE COURT: Could you just direct the witness to whatever it is you want him to answer? Just ask the witness to focus on the question.

- Q. (By Ms. Gould) Where did you learn about packaging methods for marijuana?
- A. At the Las Cruces resident office through other agents.

- Q. And did you receive any formal training in addition to that?
- A. I attended a two-week narc basic school in Las Cruces, New Mexico as well, ma'am.
  - Q. Who put on that school?
  - A. The Drug Enforcement Administration.
- Q. Was that a precursor to your working as an agent for Drug Enforcement Agency?
  - A. Yes, ma'am.

- Q. In that course did you learn about the packing methods?
  - A. It was talked about several times, yes, ma'am.
- Q. So with regards to how marijuana is bundled, how do they do it?
- A. Like I was stating, there are several ways that they use it. They either pack it in small bricks, it depends on the size. These big bundles, we see it a lot, it's just one big square, and then you wrap it with a certain cellophane, and then they do another layer of maybe mustard, coffee grinds, pickle juice, anything to mask the odor of marijuana in order to avoid the checkpoints and the K-9; brown packaging tape. A lot of foil is used also due to the x-ray machine that are used at some checkpoints, it reflects the x-ray. It's just several types of packaging, ma'am.
  - Q. Is it typically packed very densely into these

bundles?

- A. Yes, ma'am, very tight.
- Q. How is that done?
- A. They make big, big molds and then they put the marijuana in there, and then they use something else to compact it. They hold it there, and then put another layer, compact it and put another layer, they compact it, until it gets to the size that they want.
  - Q. Do they do that for space efficiency?

    MR. ROBERT: Objection, speculation.

    THE COURT: As posed the question's speculation.
- Q. (By Ms. Gould) Is there a reason that the marijuana would be compacted like it is?
- A. It would be for a, to get a big quantity into a smaller space of where they need to conceal and take the marijuana to its destination.
  - Q. In this case how was the marijuana packaged?
- A. It's packaged about the same way, ma'am, large bricks, a couple of layers of foil. Brown packaging tape to keep it all together.
- Q. Did you, have you ever had incident to see a load where there was loose marijuana floating around in a potato bag?
  - A. No, ma'am, I haven't.
  - Q. Would you say that the method of packaging in this

case was consistent with other drug cases that you've seen 1 2 that did not involve the allegation of a church activity? Α. 3 Yes, ma'am. MS. GOULD: Your Honor, I would mark this photograph, 4 5 or a copy of this photograph, as Government's Exhibit Number 11 for identification. I'll show it to defense counsel. THE COURT: Any objection? MR. ROBERT: No, Your Honor. 8 9 THE COURT: All right, Government's Exhibit 11 is admitted. 10 11 MS. GOULD: Your Honor, I have no further questions 12 for this witness at this time. 13 THE COURT: All right. Mr. Robert? 14 MR. ROBERT: Yes, Your Honor. 15 CROSS-EXAMINATION MR. ROBERT: 16 You can compress marijuana in a factory, can't you, 17 18 if you had the right equipment? 19 Α. Yes, sir. 20 Basically what you need is a box and some weight; 21 right? 22 Α. Correct, sir. 23 You can put a -- well, you got to harvest the marijuana from the plant that grows there; right? 24 25 Α. Correct.

Put that in something, put more of it in, put some 1 Ο. 2 weight on top of it, squish it down? 3 A. Correct. Anyplace that you have a box and some weight you can 4 0. 5 do this? Well, not just a typical box. Α. Okay. A box that's strong enough to hold the weight? 7 Q. 8 A. Correct, sir. So you could have a box that's strong enough to hold 9 Q. 10 the weight in your garage? 11 A. Correct, sir. You could do it in your kitchen? 12 Q. 13 Α. Yes, sir. You could do it in a barn in a ranch in Mexico? 14 Q. 15 Yes, sir. Α. 16 Q. You could do it in a monastery? 17 A. Yes, sir. 18 The way in which something is packaged doesn't tell you a thing about the way that it's going to be used, does it? 19 20 Α. No, sir. 21 Now the vast majority of cases that you get involves marijuana that's going to be taken by somebody and sold 22
