1	MR. ROBERT: Richard Mack was, for a period of time,
2	the sheriff of Grant County, a county in which Pima is
3	situated, a county in which the Quaintances live. Mr. Mack,
4	of course, is a part of law enforcement, was charged with the
5	interdiction and investigation of drug crimes. And part of
6	that, as everybody over on that side knows, is keeping your
7	ear to the ground and acting on tips and information. And a
8	part of what I expect Mr. Mack to testify to is that he never
9	heard a whisper of any sort of illicit drug trafficking going
10	on at the Quaintances.
11	MR. MARTINEZ: I don't know if that's relevant
12	because, I mean I
13	MR. ROBERT: I think it's essentially relevant.
14	MR. MARTINEZ: I guess, does this go to a period of
15	time after his arrest?
16	MR. ROBERT: Let's ask the witness.
17	THE COURT: Yeah, we're going to have to just hear
18	the testimony.
19	RICHARD MACK
20	after having been first duly sworn under oath,
21	was questioned and testified as follows:
22	DIRECT EXAMINATION
23	BY MR. ROBERT:
24	Q. Tell us your name, please?
25	A. My name is Richard Mack.

- Q. Mr. Mack, where do you live?
- A. I actually live in Pima, Arizona, just a few miles from the county seat in Safford.
  - Q. Safford is where the federal prison is?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. Which, unfortunately, we know about.

- Q. What do you do there?
- A. I'm a car salesman and I'm presently running for the United States senate.
- Q. Good luck. Were you ever the sheriff of Grant County?
- A. Yes, I was.
  - Q. Tell us, sir, what period of time.
- A. I first ran in 1988. I was a police officer before that in Utah for 11 years, and Safford, Arizona is my home town, and I moved home to run for sheriff in '88. I was elected, and reelected in '92, and lost my third election in '96, and moved away in '97.
- Q. All right. So you were the sheriff during the time period from 1991 to 1996?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. Do you know Mr. Quaintance?
- A. Yes, I know him.
  - Q. And could you tell us in what context you knew him?

- While I was sheriff I was the DARE instructor at Pima 1 Α. Elementary School, where their son attended. And I was 2 actually -- he was my student. And I knew the Quaintances 3 just, just because it's small community. I never associated 4 with them socially, or anything like that, but I knew of them 5 and saw them in town, or around town. And I was always 6 7 friendly with them. During the time that you were sheriff did you 8 9 investigate drug crimes?
  - A. Of course.

- Q. Did you have occasion to act on information concerning illicit drug transactions?
- A. Yes, I had my own informants, that were private citizens, that kept me aware of that.
- Q. All right. So, as an example, how would information come to you?
- A. Either through my officers and their informants, or my own informants. That's basically -- or the Narcotics Task Force, which was a combination of local departments.
- Q. And if something, or if information were to come to the attention of the task force, would that also come to your own attention?
  - A. Yes, absolutely; that was a requirement.
- Q. Okay. And when information would come to you, what would you do, how would you act on it?

Well, if we got wind or information that, you know, 1 Α. wasn't enough to justify an arrest, and if we heard any kind 2 of information or intelligence reports, we would try to send 3 4 in informants to make a case. 5 Q. All right. And did that happen often? 6 Α. Oh, yes. 7 Q. During the time that you were sheriff, did you ever hear of anything of the sort at the Quaintances' residents? 8 9 Α. No. 10 Or among their family, who also lived in the area? Ο. 11 Α. No. 12 MR. ROBERT: May I have a moment, please? 13 THE COURT: You may. 14 MR. ROBERT: That's all. Thank you. 15 I pass the witness. 16 THE COURT: Cross-examination, Mr. Martinez? 17 MR. MARTINEZ: Yes, Your Honor. Thank you. 18 CROSS-EXAMINATION 19 BY MR. MARTINEZ: Mr. Mack, where do you live now? 20 Q. 21 Α. Pima, Arizona. 22 You still live in Pima? Q. 23 Α. Before I did, I lived in Thatcher when I was 24 sheriff, but I taught school in Pima. 25 Q. And your last date as sheriff was 1996?

- A. I left office January 1st of '97.
  - Q. So you haven't been in law enforcement for ten years; is that right?
    - A. Yes.

- Q. And you weren't a sheriff when the Quaintances were arrested in February, 2006, were you?
  - A. No.
    - Q. And you weren't part of that investigation, were you?
- A. No.
- Q. You weren't at the scene when they were arrested, were you?
- 12 A. No.
  - Q. You don't know what they said at the time of their arrest, do you?
  - A. No.
- Q. You don't know how much marijuana was in the vehicles that they were in control of, do you?
  - A. No.
    - Q. You're friends of Mr. Quaintance; isn't that right?
  - A. Friendly. To say we're friends would mean that we did things socially together, and we never did.
  - Q. Do you know if Mr. Quaintance has rented or leased vehicles for the last year?
    - A. Do I know if he rented vehicles?
- Q. Has he leased any vehicles in that area in the last

year? 1 Α. No. Have you been to Mr. Quaintance's trailer, for lack 3 Q. of a better word, compound, in the last year? Α. 5 Yes. 6 You have been there in this last 12 months? Ο. 7 Α. Yes. 8 Ο. And are you part of the Church of Cognizance? 9 Α. No, I'm a Mormon. 10 MR. MARTINEZ: I pass the witness, Your Honor. 11 THE COURT: Anything further? 12 MR. ROBERT: No, thank you, not from me. 13 THE COURT: May this witness be excused? 14 MR. ROBERT: Yes, Your Honor. 15 THE COURT: All right. Mr. Mack, you may be 16 Thank you for your testimony here this afternoon. 17 You may call your next witness, Mr. Robert. MR. ROBERT: Your Honor, I call Michael Singer. 18 19 MS. CONVERSE: I'm Carrie Converse, I'm appointed counsel for Mr. Singer. May I sit by the witness? 20 21 THE COURT: You may. 22 MS. CONVERSE: Thank you. 23 MR. MARTINEZ: Your Honor, just for the record, I believe that Mr. Singer has been advised by counsel as to the 24 ramifications regarding his Fifth Amendment right to remain 25
